Fr. Nathan's Eucharistic Article 33 of 40

"Lord, teach us to pray" (Lk 11:1)

With the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer, we know move into the Communion Rite of Mass. It may be wondered that if the Mass is supposed to represent the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross, why then do we have Communion? Actually, the consumption of part of the host was required in the ancient sacrificial practice. It symbolized that person as being a guest of God since the sacrificial gift is now His and yet He gives part of it back. This was a symbol before Christ, but through Mass we join Jesus selfoffering to the Father, and the Father in turn offers Him as spiritual food.

In the early Church, the Communion Rite was simpler: Breaking of the Bread, Lord's Prayer, then Communion. Throughout the centuries different prayers and ceremonies were added to assist the faithful in their focus and devotion during this most august moment. Now, there is the Lord's Prayer (preceded by the invitation to pray and followed by the Embolism and the people's acclamation), Rite of Peace, Breaking of the Bread (with the Commingling and "Lamb of God"), Priest's personal preparation, Invitation to the sacred banquet by the showing of the host, Communion of the priest and the faithful, Silent Prayer, Post Communion Prayer.

It may at first seem peculiar or random to include the Lord's Prayer here in the Mass; but, think of prayer's ultimate purpose: to align our hearts and minds with our Lord's. Being aligned with our Lord is the key to being our best selves (cf. art. 2), and misalignment is the cause of our deepest distresses and failures (cf. art. 3). Considering that Communion is all about being properly aligned with God, it is fitting that prayer is present immediately before so that our hearts and minds are prepared for this encounter. The apostles themselves knew the importance of prayer, and yet were aware how their own personal shortcomings frustrated the effectiveness of their prayer. Thus, they ask Jesus "how to pray." This prayer, composed by Jesus Himself, most appropriately shows how we are to approach our Lord. Due to the essential importance this prayer has in our preparation for a Holy Communion, let's consider the clauses:

Our Father: Jesus used the Aramaic word "Abba," which is the word a child called their father. Probably best translated as "daddy." Thus, it indicates that God wants to deal with us as his little children. It indicates our Lord's love for us, as well as the fact we are part of a greater family.

Hallowed be thy name: This is not that we make God's name holy by our prayers; rather, we are asking that God's name be holy for us personally. In this first petition we are essentially asking that our Lord will in fact be our first and most important priority, and nothing else takes that place ... for we seen what happens when it does (cf. art. 3).

Thy kingdom come: In this second petition, we ask that our Lord may reign in everybody's will. It's a petition that we may realize the fullness of His plan in this life and the

Thy will be done on earth as is it in heaven: In this third petition, its not a presumption that our Lord's will needs our prayers to be actualized (God can do what He wants). Rather, it's a petition that we may carry out His will. It's a prayer for our will to align more perfectly with His.

Give us this day our daily bread: This fourth petition is the request for us to be and remain in Communion with our Lord. The word "daily" is an unfortunate translation of the Greek term used "Epiousion," which means "supersubstantial." In other words, give us the bread not of this world, but the bread of Heaven that lifts our soul.

Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive ...: One of the worst things we can do in the spiritual life is be naive and delusional about our own status, because it causes us to remain in mediocrity and not break through to greatness. This fifth petition challenges us to be mindful of our shortcomings ... not to be negative, but to be aware of the opportunities before us. In addition, with the clause about forgiving others, it challenges us to grow our hearts into Jesus' own Sacred Heart.

Lead us not into temptation: This sixth petition is a request for our Lord's assistance not to succumb to the evil temptations in this world that keep us from being our best, and reaching real happiness and meaning.

Deliver us from evil: In this seventh petition (notice there are seven petitions [cf. art. 2], the biblical number for perfection), we request our Lord's assistance to remove any evil that is present in our life. Evil always weighs us down, God wants to build us up ... here, we pray that we may not get in our Lord's way.

The prayer concludes by putting our focus on the end goal. Thus, the private intercession of the priest looks at clearing the path of this life so that we may encounter our Lord. And the people's acclamation sums it all up: "For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and Fr. Nathan forever."
