Fr. Nathan's Eucharistic Article 38 of 40

"You are witnesses of these things. And behold I am sending the promise of the Father upon you ... They did him homage and returned to Jerusalem with great joy" (Lk 24:48-49, 52)

After the final collect is said, we enter into the Concluding Rite. It consists of a blessing, dismissal, and the reverence of the altar. The blessing begins with the typical formula: "The Lord be with you ... and with your spirit." While it may sound odd to say "spirit," it draws our attention to the soul of the priest that was permanently marked at his ordination, and through which our Lord operates (cf. art. 12). Conversely, it's a challenge to the priest to cooperate with the Holy Spirit.

Although we speak of it often, an obvious question that we should ask is: "what is a blessing, and what does it do?" As we have seen throughout the Mass, several blessings are made, both on objects (e.g. water) and people. In general, a blessing fundamentally reminds us that we live in a *fallen* world. The Bible often depicts our world in terms of a war between good and evil. For example, St. John said "We know that we belong to God, and the whole world is under the power of the evil one" (1 Jn 5:19). So, too, St. Paul speaks of the effects of this battle on ourselves "our struggle is not with flesh and blood but with principalities, with powers, with the world rulers of this present darkness, with evil spirits in the heavens" (Eph 6:12); as well as on the physical world, "We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now" (Rom 8:22). This is the setting, but we see with Jesus that He is the "Light" that "shines in darkness. and the darkness has not overcome it" (Jn 1:5). In this analogy of a "spiritual war," we know that Jesus won the battle on the Cross (cf. art. 6): "but thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor 15:57). Nonetheless, in this life the war continues even though we know the outcome is predetermined. The role of a blessing, either on people or objects, is to bring it into the dominion of our Lord from that of evil (so we bless objects so that they inspire us with goodness), and to tap it into the power of Christ victory on the Cross (we bless people on routinely so that they have the spiritual power to keep fighting off the ways of the evil one). With this basic understanding in place, it is logical then to offer a blessing on the faithful at the end of Mass as they prepare to return to the "battlefield" of this fallen world.

After the blessing, the priest gives the dismissal, which has several formations (e.g. "go forth the Mass has ended"), and then reverences the altar with a kiss. As mentioned in a previous article (i.e. art. 20), the "kiss" draws to mind the sinful woman who bathed Jesus' feet with her tears and then kissed them (Lk 7:38). The Mass is officially over at this point.

Even though the Mass is over, we still have the final procession (cf. art. 20) which symbolizes the power of the Cross now going into the world. Often there is a closing hymn as well to capture the theme of that Mass (cf. art. 18). From 1884-1965, there were additional prayers said before the final procession, known as the Leonine Prayers. These were prayers introduced by Pope Leo XIII in reaction to anti-clerical political and social developments in Europe. In effect, he was directing the graces of the Cross to this problem. These were short prayers, one of which was the prayer to St. Michael, the patron saint for spiritual battle. While the prayers are no longer obligatory, our Bishop has invited the parishes of the diocese to recite the St. Michael prayer at the end of Mass due to the issues facing our nation. *Fr. Nathan*
